It was a difficult task at times, but Hippie did it with professionalism and confidence. I am proud to have seen him shine at moments like that.

Hippie had a heart of gold and would give you the shirt off of his back. For those of you that know Hippie, think of a point in the scout law. Hippie exemplified every point in those 12 words in his own unique way.

Wilderness Turns 60

Nearly 700 people gathered August 18 – 20 at Camp Wilderness to celebrate sixty years of Camp Wilderness serving Scouts. The combined family weekend, Butler Wilderness Outpost dedication, and 60th Anniversary celebration was packed with activities.

While families participated in swimming, boating, fishing, rifle, archery, and BB-gun, Alum and decedents of founding members of camp socialized, caught up, and shared stories and pictures. Many organizations had displays and booths. Don Carlson and Roger Smart transformed the Winter Trading Post into a Wilderness Scouting Museum with patches, hats, shirts, and more dating back to 1945. The Alumni Association of the Northern Lights Camps commandeered the Black Building with displays showing *The Association* activities and pictures and flyers from all decades of the camp. Alum paged through the 1600 plus names in the Alumni Roster database and helped identify people in the 30 staff photos that had been collected and were on display. Retro 1946 Wilderness Camps t-shirts were popping up everywhere.

Following the Eagle Scout lunch held in Iowa campsite, the new courtyard of the Cub Camp was packed with onlookers as the camp flag and American Flag were raised over the camp for the first time. The dedication ceremony was filled with celebration and recognition of a job well done.

Hundreds gathered for the 60th dedication as several spoke and brought back memories of the past 60 years of Wilderness. Naomi Reed Rhode was the keynote speaker and spoke about coming to the camp gate in 1945 with her father (Virgil Reed) and many

others as they blazed the trail into camp and spend the first summer at the beach.

Ed Stern, Dr. Baker's son, Jim Little, the first camp ranger, and staff from all generations enjoyed the activities and were in aught of the changes and improvements that have been made to camp over the past 60 years. As the weekend wound down and people started to say goodbye, the resounding theme was, "I'll see you at the next one."

Alumni Board




2006 Annual Meeting


